

The Second Sunday in Ordinary Time January 14, 2024

Dear Parishioners,

In our readings this week we see the origin stories of some heavy hitters. The Lord speaks to Samuel for the first time, setting of his life as a judge and prophet. Samuel will go on to pronounce judgement on King Saul and anoint David as the new king whose kingdom will endure forever. In the gospel, Andrew and John meet Christ for the first time and come away convinced they have found the Messiah.

All three men have the course of their lives radically changed by an encounter with God. Interestingly, all three men are also somewhat flummoxed by the experience. Samuel doesn't understand it is God calling out to Him until the third attempt. Andrew and John are drawn to Christ, but can't clearly explain why or what is happening. When our Lord asks, "What are you looking for?" they have no answer.

Even though all three don't understand the enormity of what is happening, they still come away changed. God unexpectedly bursts into their life and sets them on a new course. These three men will play an instrumental part in salvation history and it all begins with this one moment of encounter.

We should note that although God initiated the encounter, each man was in a position to respond. Samuel is sleeping in the temple where he spends his days serving, close to the Lord's dwelling. Andrew and John are following John the Baptist and listening to his teaching. The three have put themselves near God and are attentive to Him. That attentiveness is absolutely critical. God must initiate the encounter, but it is man's duty to be ready for it.

The world has always had plenty of distractions, but never more than it does today. Picture these encounters playing out in modern times with men not really paying attention. Instead of sleeping, Samuel is laying in bed scrolling through TikTok. Andrew and John have their noses buried in their phones or perhaps one earbud in, only half listening to John. One can easily imagine how things would have been different: God was still present, but unnoticed.

The tools at our disposal make it incredibly easy to fill every moment of the day with activity and noise. The radio or TV always on, our phones beeping incessantly, jumping from distraction to distraction without a second's pause. We must make a conscious effort to create times when we are still; truly present to God and to each other. We do this through the sacraments, our daily prayer, and cultivating periods of silence. Only then will we be able to be attentive and hear God speaking to us, to encounter the divine.







Thank you to all our priests and Key Parish Leaders from across the Diocese of Peoria for hosting Growing Disciples parish meetings to explain the second set of draft models and how parishioners could provide feedback. Gathering information from those parish meetings is a critical element in the ability to move forward in this important pastoral planning process.

The Growing Disciples Core Team received over 2600 electronic and paper surveys. Bishop Tylka received several hundred personal letters from parishioners and community members, sharing their feelings about the process and what our possibilities could be as we look to the future. The feedback has come from all over the diocese and all parishes. Not everyone in every parish, or even every family, agreed on the steps we should take moving forward.

What is clear is that this process is awakening within all of us that desire for us to continue to be the Church and to grow the Church. We are passionate about our faith. We are passionate about our parishes. We are passionate about our mission that Jesus has given to us to share the Good News.

We also know we are living in very different times. The generations that preceded us had their own challenges and opportunities to live out our faith. Ours is a very different time and we must discern a way forward to build a more sustainable, mission driven, vibrant church for tomorrow.

In the coming months, our Growing Disciples Core Team, our Diocesan Commission and ultimately the Presbyteral Council will be discerning recommendations, based on the feedback, to be given to the Bishop, who will make the final decision.

Let us remain a people of prayer: praying for each other and supporting one another as we go through this process.

The Diocese of Peoria is constantly updating the website (growing disciples cdop.org), so check back frequently. Please continue to pray that all our efforts today will bear fruit for a brighter tomorrow.
