

The Third Sunday in Ordinary Time January 21, 2024

Dear Parishioners,

Assyria invaded Israel several times, inflicting great destruction and carrying away thousands of Israelites as captives. To the Israelites, the Assyrians had three strikes against them as a result: they were gentiles, they were enemies of the people, and they were enemies of God. As the capital, Nineveh was a symbol of not just the Assyrian empire, but also a stand in for all that is evil in the world. Not exactly a city that seems ripe with potential for conversion.

When God sends Jonah to warn the Ninevites of their doom unless they repent, they miraculously listen. Fearing the destruction, the entire city repents with fasting and sackcloth and are spared. What could cause such a remarkable change of heart? The first and most obvious answer is the grace of God. Only an incredible outpouring of grace can explain why the city believed Jonah's prophecy of destruction.

The second answer is that having accepted what Jonah says as truth, the Ninevites gained a new perspective. All the things they committed, their crimes to obtain wealth, power, slaves, etc..., were suddenly worthless. What good does a pile of gold do if I about to die? All that matters now is turning from evil to the good. Everything else is pointless.

The awareness that their time is running out changes the way the Assyrians approach life. We are not facing imminent doom, but we too know "the time is running out." St. Paul is referring to the second coming of Christ, the end of all things as they currently are. Christians see time as something bookended by two key events, creation and the second coming. Anything that happens between those two events is ultimately unimportant, except insofar as it affects our readiness to meet the Lord.

Living by this perspective gives us the capacity to live in the world without being of the world: "buying as not owning" and "using the world as not using it fully." We see an example of what this looks like in practice in the gospel. Simon, Andrew, James, and John all leave their jobs, possessions, and families when Christ calls them. These fishermen are of the world, but at the same time they are not absorbed by it.

The detachment of the future apostles makes them free to say yes to God. They encounter Christ and without hesitation begin to follow Him because their hearts are not tied down to earthly, temporary things. Their hearts are set on the things that endure forever. They thus stand as an example for us to emulate when considering how to live St. Paul's warning: "I tell you, brothers and sisters, the time is running out... For the world in its present form is passing away."
