

The Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time February 4, 2024

Dear Parishioners,

Poor Job is having a rough go of things. In a short span he lost his herds, children, health. It's no wonder Job is in such a negative frame of mind. "Is not man's life on earth a drudgery?... I shall not see happiness again." Job wrestles with understanding why all this is happening to him and ultimately concludes the ways of the Lord are too mysterious for him to grasp. He continues in faith and ends up with more than he began with.

Simon's mother in law is having a toned down Job experience. Incapacitated with a fever, it's easy to imagine she wasn't in the cheeriest of moods. She almost certainly wasn't expecting Christ to arrive out of the blue and heal her, but that is what happens. A problem she had resigned herself to just having to endure is suddenly resolved.

The same is true for the crowd of sick and possessed people that come to our Lord that evening. Some may have had minor maladies, but there were surely many with serious, longstanding afflictions they had given up hope of being freed from. They are going about their day, unsuspecting anything out of the ordinary is happening, and Christ makes a dramatic entrance into their life.

We can see a clear pattern of God working in and through the events of our life, even the ones that seem incomprehensible to us. He is always working for our good, using even the evil we suffer to our benefit if we have faith. The end of our gospel reading shows this even more clearly. The people are looking for our Lord, wanting Him to remain with them, but He leaves to preach to other towns. From their perspective, Christ has left them on their own. But in reality, He is continuing the work of salvation, working so they can be restored not just to physical life, but to everlasting life with God.

At every moment of our life, a whole slew of forces are working for our good: God, the angels, the saints in heaven, our family and friends, and even the prayers of strangers. Some of this assistance we see, but much of it is invisible to us. However, that does not make it any less real. We may not feel grace or others' prayers or we may not know someone is working things out for us behind the scenes, but it is still happening.

If we're having a Job period when everything seems to be going wrong and everything looks bleak, it is good to remind ourselves of this fact. We are not alone. Far from it. The Lord Jesus, the saints and angels, and entire Church on earth are behind us. Anticipating the time when things will turn around, either in this life or the next, we can take Job as our model. His faith brought him through the dark night to a glorious dawn. Our faith will do the same.

Excerpt from Pope Francis' Angelus Address St. Peter's Square January 28, 2024

This is how the devil acts this is the way he acts: he wants to take possession of us in order to "enchain our souls." To enchain our souls: this is what the devil wants. We must be careful with the "chains" that suffocate our freedom, because the devil always takes away our freedom. Let us try to name some of the chains that can shackle our hearts.

I am thinking of addictions, which enslave us and make us constantly dissatisfied, and which devour our energies, goods, and relationships. Another chain I am thinking of is dominant trends that encourage the pursuit of impossible perfectionisms, consumerism, and hedonism, which commodify people and spoil relationships. And yet more chains: there are temptations and conditionings that undermine self-esteem, that undermine peacefulness, and the ability to choose and love life. Another chain is fear, which makes us look to the future with pessimism, and dissatisfaction, which always blames others. Then there is a very ugly chain, which is the idolatry of power, which generates conflicts and resorts to weapons that kill or uses economic injustice and thought manipulation.

Many are our chains, there truly are many in our lives.

And Jesus came to free us from all these chains. Jesus has the power to drive out the devil. Jesus frees us from the power of evil but – let us be careful – he drives out the devil but he never negotiates with him! Jesus never negotiated with the devil and when he was tempted in the desert, Jesus' responses were always words from the Bible, never a dialogue. Brothers and sisters: with the devil there must be no dialogue! Be careful: with the devil there can be no dialogue, because if you start speaking to him, he will always win. Be careful.

So, what should we do when we feel tempted and oppressed? Negotiate with the devil? No: there must be no negotiating with him.

We must invoke Jesus: let us call on Him from those places where we feel that the chains of evil and fear are tightest.

Let us ask ourselves: Do I really want to be freed from those chains that shackle my heart? And also, am I capable of saying "no" to the temptations of evil before they creep into my soul? Finally, do I invoke Jesus, allowing Him to act in me, to heal me from within?

May the Holy Virgin guard us from evil.
