

Dear Parishioners,

The collect (opening prayer) for the 3rd Sunday of Easter is: "May your people exult for ever, O God, in renewed youthfulness of spirit, so that, rejoicing now in the restored glory of our adoption, we may look forward in confident hope to the rejoicing of the day of resurrection." The phrase that really jumps out to me is youthfulness of spirit.

The young tend to be optimistic. Every new generation thinks they are going to be the ones to fix all the problems their forebears created. This is partially a result of the typical arrogance of youth and a certain naivete that goes along with inexperience, but it also stems from a real daring. The young have the courage to think even long shots are possible.

As one ages, the benefits of experience give them a greater ability to accomplish their goals, but there is also the risk of becoming jaded or cynical. Having grown accustomed to how things are, we begin to think they will never change. Instead of revolutionizing the world, the old are more likely to try to secure their place within it.

I'm certainly not an old man, but I'm also no longer in the early stages of youth. As the years have gone by, I can feel that constant tug to make my peace with the world as it is; the whisper that change will be limited or non-existent, so there's no point in beating my head against the wall. While tempting, such an attitude leaves us feeling stuck.

The Christian cannot live this way. To believe in the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead necessarily means we believe God has conquered. The world, and even the Church, may seem to be stuck in the dreariness of sin, but it's not true. Every person can turn to Christ and receive new life, which will endure for all time. The apparent victories of evil are temporary sallies of an already defeated foe.

I used to visit a woman in Streator who lived this way. She was home bound, had lots of pain, and her husband had died quite a few years ago. Humanly speaking, there wasn't much to rejoice in and no hope of it getting better. Yet every time I visited her, she would gush about how good God had been to her and how grateful she was. Instead of cheering her up, I was the one who left encouraged. I was also humbled, because she had the youthful spirit I all too often lacked.

We are not victims of chance or poor things left to our own devices. We are children of our heavenly Father through our Lord Jesus Christ. May we never forget that and allow ourselves to become crusty, dreary souls.





St. Andrew of Crete - A Saint Devoted to the Eucharist

St. Andrew of Crete (650-c.726) also known as St. Andrew of Jerusalem, was born in the Syrian city of Damascus to devout Christian parents. According to his hagiographers, he was mute until he was 7 years old and miraculously cured after he received his First Holy Communion.

As a young teenager, Andrew entered a monastery near Jerusalem. His exceptional qualities quickly caught the attention of his superiors, leading to his appointment as Archdeacon by Theodore, the Patriarch of Jerusalem at the time. The Patriarch of Jerusalem is the head bishop of the Greek Orthodox Patriarchate of Jerusalem. Theodore also sent Andrew to represent the Church at the Sixth Ecumenical Council in Constantinople called by Emperor Constantine, playing a role in addressing the heresy of Monothelitism. This Sixth Council was pivotal in establishing that Jesus had both divine and human nature.

St. Andrew of Crete would go on to become an influential theologian, bishop, and hymnographer. Around the year 700 he was appointed Archbishop of the city of Gortyn, on the island of Crete. His service to the Church included charitable work for the poor and orphaned and he is credited with introducing the canon, a new form of hymn, into the liturgy.

His most renowned work, the Great Canon, is a masterpiece that guides the faithful through repentance and a return to God. To this day, the Great Canon is chanted twice a year in Eastern Orthodox liturgies during Lent. It takes around three hours to complete and includes more than 200 full-body prostrations along with its many odes, litanies, and refrains.

While the exact date of Andrew's death remains uncertain, it is known that he passed away on the island of Mytilene while returning to Crete from Constantinople. St. Andrew of Crete, pray for us! © LPi
