## *Divine Mercy* *April 7, 2024*

Dear Parishioners,

Happy Easter! Like Christmas, Easter is too big to be contained to just one day, so we celebrate it as an octave, ending with Divine Mercy Sunday. The link between the resurrection and mercy may not be immediately obvious to us, primarily because we have a bad habit of reducing mercy to simple forgiveness, but the two do indeed go hand in hand.

The Latin word for mercy, *miser cordiae*, gives us more insight. It is a compound word made up of *miseriae* (unhappy or miserable) and *cordis* (heart). The merciful person is thus miserable of heart. The cause of their sorrow is seeing the misery of another. Mercy takes on another’s suffering as if it was our own, prompting action to resolve whatever causes harm.

Mercy is very closely related to love. When we love someone, we identify ourselves with them. Their good is our good and their suffering is our suffering. Mercy can be understood as a subset or aspect of love. If we love someone, we will be merciful with them, i.e. we will try to resolve whatever causes them sorrow.

At times, this will mean forgiving offenses, but mercy goes much further. Not only will we forgive, we will also take concrete steps to help the one struggling, even if doing so comes at great personal cost. Now the link between Easter and divine mercy becomes clear. Our Lord’s passion, death, and resurrection were acts of great love undertaken to free us from the misery of sin and death. They are acts of mercy.


Our Easter celebration is not just us marveling at what great things God has done. Our joy includes and is intensified by the knowledge that He has done such great things for me, a poor sinner who in no way deserves it. “I was hard pressed and was falling, but the LORD helped me.” His mercy continues to be poured out on the world whenever a sinner repents. Once again Christ frees them from sin and returns them to life. No person of good will need ever again fear for their salvation, for “His mercy endures forever.”

The God of love and mercy has saved us and remains with us today, and so we rejoice. For those of faith, there is no greater source of joy than Easter. For those without faith, there’s not much joy in Easter at all. It lacks the nostalgia and romanticism of Christmas, which is probably why it doesn’t have a large place in broader American culture. When we rejoice it is a sign of our faith and a witness that the Lord lives. Our joy, especially in difficult circumstances, may be what brings the faithless “to believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and... through this belief... have life in his name.”
